*Dear members and friends,
as you are all aware, major changes will take place at the turn of the year: The Federation will get a new President and several new Council members. There's the collaboration between EUROPARC and Eurosite to consider. Plus, the Nordic-Baltic Section secretariat will move from Sweden to Estonia. These events may seem far away, but this month is when many important decisions will be made and, naturally, much of this issue of the newsletter evolves around the EUROPARC Conference 2011 and General Assembly. Also, you get to meet the Section's future President and coordinator. But, we'll start with a report from an inspiring summer camp in one of our Lithuanian member parks.*

Young Scientists' Camp in Dzūkija NP



At the end of June this year, Dzūkija National Park and Čepkeliai State Nature Reserve organized a Young Scientists' Camp to stimulate interest in nature and our environment. Nine students from Varėna „Ažuolas“ gymnasium, Varėna „Rytas“ progymnasium and Merkinė V. Krėvės gymnasium got the chance to deepen their practical knowledge by learning about nature, in nature. The camp was sponsored by Varėna district municipality.

The Young Scientists' Camp consists of three parts. This time students learnt to recognize birds, birdsongs and higher plants. They got information about Dzūkija National Park. In addition, the young scientists learnt to be in



nature without disturbing it and without leaving traces of their activities. The students have learnt to *feel* nature, to see and hear things which they cannot get from tutorials.

Moreover, we expect that, while making discoveries themselves, students will better understand nature conservation issues.

The students were encouraged to look for answers in manuals and audio records. We studied edible, medicinal and noxious plants. At the end of the camp, all students together made an illustrated camp diary. The third part of this camp will be organized in September – October, and the same students will learn to identify the mushrooms of the Dzūkija region.

We hope to continue this project and, in the future, we would like to also organize similar camps to deepen the students' knowledge about other topics i.

Together with my husband Aleksei Lotman, I was awarded the WWF Elisabeth Jihde Memorial Award for nature conservation in cooperation with local communities, especially for developing a meadow management system for Estonia.

On the personal side, I am a mother of 4 grown-ups and a grandmother of 3 happy children. I live in the countryside and we have two Estonian Native Horses, 2 hens and a cat on our small farm in the nice village of Matsalu.



Nele Sõber, future coordinator

I was born on March 9th, 1978 in Pärnu. I studied international business specializing in marketing at an international university in Estonia (CIUE). At first, my work experiences were especially connected with marketing, but after moving to Lihula the job tasks have changed a bit, but not totally. For your information – Lihula is one of the municipalities where Matsalu National Park is situated and the national park centre in Penijõe is also in Lihula municipality.

I have worked in Matsalu for 6 years and the tasks have always been related to sustainable nature tourism development in the protected area. Right now, I am project manager in the project "Parks and Benefits". I have experiences in NGO and public sector level and also with EU structural fund project world.

Here, we've asked Thomas some questions about his candidacy.

Thomas Hansson, current president of the Nordic-Baltic Section, is one of the candidates in the upcoming EUROPARC Federation President elections. We decided to ask him 5 questions.

Hello Thomas, you stand candidate in the upcoming EUROPARC President election. Why?

"To me, international cooperation is absolutely necessary to develop both nature conservation overall and our individual professional skills as managers of protected areas. And here's where I find the EUROPARC network so useful: I have very good experiences from EUROPARC activities.

With EUROPARC Federation as our 'voice', we can make a better future for the management of protected nature in Europe."

What do you consider the most important tasks for EUROPARC Federation in the next two years?

"Internally, it is to consolidate the Federation's finances - by recruiting new members and through projects and activities. Also, we should strive to influence the EU policies that affect nature conservation during the next programme period."

How would the Federation benefit from having a president from the Nordic-Baltic region?

"First of all, it is important to remember that the President does not represent any certain region, but works for the entire EUROPARC membership.

While our region may not be the most conspicuous in Europe, we have long experience from working in multinational contexts, where we collaborate between countries. We also have a lot of nature and NATURA 2000 sites. Plus, we live in border areas of the EU and know the situation on the 'edge'."

What is the most important experience you would bring to the Federation?

"I've worked with nature conservation and management almost all my life. From the local to international levels. I've been an employee and an independent consultant for governmental agencies, companies, and NGO's. Plus, since 2006, I'm involved in local and regional politics, working on issues related to nature and the environment. So, I've gained quite wide and very hands-on experiences from most aspects of the field. Altogether, these experiences will help me represent the wide and multifaceted EUROPARC membership in a good way."

Last, but not least, why should the Nordic-Baltic Section members vote for you?

"Because they want a president with a genuine interest in nature, who feels great responsibility for the organisation and wants to serve all members equally. I know how to analyze organisations and their work, and always try to find new solutions. I take pride in listening to and discussing different opinions and ideas. I make decisions and manage the results responsibly.

Thanks to the support of the Swedish EPA, at least 50% of my working time will be devoted to EUROPARC."

Following the Healing Bonanza of Kemer National Park



Human health is a topical issue these days, and the healing powers of nature known to our ancestors centuries ago, but somehow forgotten in a modern urbanized world, are more and more often remembered, spoken of and appreciated. In addition to the recreation possibilities offered by seashores, forests, virgin raised bogs and inspiring wildlife in Kemer National Park, Latvia, the area has also been blessed with sulphurous mineral waters and curative mud. Mineral water with strong healing qualities and the very specific smell of rotten eggs, has been forming deep underneath the nearby raised bogs for many centuries, erupting as a number of open springs in the surroundings of Kemer and securing production of the curative mud. These curative resources brought humans to this remote and inaccessible place centuries ago and protection of their formation processes is one of the main tasks of the Kemer National Park managing institution, the Nature Conservation Agency.

On March 24th, 2011, within the framework of the Nature Tourism Conference 2011 held in Riga, a thematic excursion to Kemer National Park was organized, for the first time concentrating on the nature and health aspect. With the peculiar name „Following the healing bonanza of Kemer National Park”, it gave participants the opportunity to follow closely the formation and use of the unique curative resources and gave an insight into the healing powers of other nature values.

After some wading in the snow to the remote place in the raised bog where sulphurous water is formed deep beneath the surface, participants were taken to the historical resort Kemer and, afterwards, to facilities where sulphurous mineral water is still used for doing miracles to peoples' health. A cup of coffee in the perfectly kept, authentic Soviet interior of the sanatorium „Jantarnij Bereg” gave insight into another page of the resort history, whilst in the resort and rehabilitation centre „Jaunkemer” participants finally had the chance to try the healing resources on their own skin. Sulphurous water and curative mud combined with other modern treatment methods are used in both medical institutions for curing wide range of diseases, e.g., gastroenerologi-

cal, skin and orthopaedic disorders, etc.

After getting to know those peculiarities that probably most strongly contribute to the unique appearance of Kemer National Park, the healing bonanza took everybo-



dy further to experience the curative powers of another important nature value - the local forests. A short Nordic walking exercise was organized by the recreation centre „Valguma Pasaule”, providing a healthy chance to stretch our legs after a nourishing lunch at the same place. This excursion laid the basis for further development of meeting the growing demand for health related activities. It also proved the fact that working with stakehol-

ders (one of the main principles of the European Charter for Sustainable Tourism that the Ķemeri National Park is trying to join within the "Parks & Benefits" project) is the best way to display the territory at its best and fullest.

Sulphurous mineral waters and curative mud

The town Ķemeri lies in the very heart of the National Park and is home to the Park Administration. First mentioned in 1561, and thanks to its healing resources, Ķemeri gradually developed into a well-known, flourishing resort, officially recognized in 1838. It is embellished by exquisite buildings used for healing procedures, housing and entertainment, and perfected by a wonderful landscape park with many kilometres of picturesque paths and romantic bridges over the small river Vēršupīte.

Ķemeri has been a place in the spotlight both before and during the Soviet Era. Widely known for its sparkling night life and exclusive pastimes, it was honoured by regular appearances by „the cream of society”. Some of the glamour can still be felt today and healing treatments, although on a much smaller scale, are still available.
